### Theoretical Background

#### **OVERPROTECTIVE PARENTING**

- → level of protection that is excessive considering the child's developmental level (Thomasgard et al., 1995)
- negative outcomes for children
- associated with parents' anxiety

(Venard et al., 2022).



#### Theoretical Background

#### **NEGATIVE WORLDVIEWS**

- → Culture of fear (Haidt & Lukianoff, 2018; Furedi, 2008)
- → Beliefs that the world is not safe, instable and there might not be enough ressources for everyone (Gurland & Grolnick, 2005)
- may make parents more or less sensitive to cues about threat for their children.

#### Theoretical Background

#### PARENTAL SELF-EFFICACY

- parents' perception on their capacity to successfully raise their children (Jones and Prinz, 2005; Bandura, 1997)
- predictor of parenting behavior and child outcomes



## Research goals

#### Negative worldviews

- elicit overprotective parenting?
- moderating role of parental selfefficacy?



## Sample

- Data collected through schools in Belgium
- N= 758 parents of adolescents
- 479 mothers (63%) and 279 fathers
- Adolescents' age: M= 16.4 (0.78)
- 54% girls and 46% boys
- Parents' age: M= 49 (5.04)
- Parent's education: 48,3% have a university degree



#### Instruments

## Overprotective parenting (10 items, MOPS, Chevrier et al., 2021)

. "I often take tasks out of my child's hands without giving him/her the chance to try them by him/herself" .  $\alpha$  = .82-.82 (M-F)

## Parental Self-Efficacy (4 items, MaaP, Hamilton et al., 2015)

- . Global PSE
- . "I have confidence in myself as a parent."
- $\alpha = .84 .85 \text{ (M-F)}$


## Negative worldviews (10 items, World Out There (Gurland & Grolnick 2005)

- . "It makes me nervous to think about all the dangers kids are exposed to today"
- $\alpha = .94 .93 \text{ (M-F)}$



# Analysis strategy

- Separate models for mothers and fathers
- Linear regression models







#### Preliminary analyses

	Over- protection	World- views	PSE	Age
Overprotection	_	0.282***	- 0.173**	- 0.077
Worldviews	0.238***	_	- 0.084	- 0.065
PSE	- 0.206***	- 0.060	_	0.010
AGE	- 0.103*	0.003	- 0.036	_








#### Mothers model

#### Discussion


- Negative worldviews are related to overprotective parenting
- PSE is also related negatively - to overprotective parenting
- -> for mothers and fathers





## Discussion

- Negative worldviews : concern for overprotective parenting
- No buffering role of PSE in the relation between negative worldviews- overprotection
